


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Chairman's Letter The National Indaba reflects the Northern Centre Spirit


In summary, an enjoyable weekend, made even better by the spirit within the Northern Centre.





Having been to the Indaba in Clarens, albeit for just for the Saturday, when our eldest son, Terry, and I went there in his TF and enjoyed the cars on display as well as the comique and d'elegance, when entries opened for the Knysna Indaba we decided to give it a go. Needless to say we had a ball with the Northern Centre contingent and we were hooked on the Indaba idea. After Knysna was our very own Northern Centre event in Pretoria which we, once again, enjoyed immensely. The next Indaba was scheduled to take place in the Drakensberg, organized by the KZN Centre so we registered and some debate took place in the Grover household as to whether a 1948 Y Type was a suitable (and sensible) mode of transport for the event.

The decision was further complicated when we realised that the week prior to the Indaba we had booked our

annual family timeshare at Champagne Sports Resort, just down the road from where the Indaba was to be held. I guess that it was Stephen who put it into perspective, saying "well, what's the worst that can happen – if it breaks we stick it on a trailer and send it home!"

And so the adventure begins. First things first –a few niggling items that have been craving attention for a while needed to be done as well as a check of all the fluids, an oil change and some fresh anti-freeze. Speedo and fuel gauge repaired, carpets removed and the edges bound, fuel pump checked (and a spare removed from the TD just in case), tyres replaced and new tubes fitted by my local, friendly tyre man who, would you believe, had tubes in stock, and informed me that they are the same size as the front wheels on old tractors, proving that there is a little bit of Triumph in the old girl! As I ran out of time to fit a temperature gauge my thanks to the Admiral for the loan of his radiator cap temperature gauge to give me some comfort on the road that things were not hotting up under the bonnet. Then, of course, the inevitable cleaning – inside, outside, underneath and then finishing off with a polish.

Thursday morning and Av and I are packing for 11 days on the road and with a boot full of sundry car stuff we manage to fill the back seats with bags of luggage and off we go, heading for an overnight stop in Clarens with Steve and Bron riding shotgun behind us. The Y type performs admirably, cruising at between 50 and 60 mph and a little slower on the up hills. We arrived at our overnight stop after dark – very dark if you have 1948 lights on a moonless night, and were warmly welcomed at the accommodation which Bron had booked for us on a farm just outside the town.

Friday morning dawned clear and bright and a quick check under the bonnet revealed a cracked fan belt so a call was made to that well known, intrepid Sani Pass explorer at the Sports Car Centre followed by another call to Mandy, our daughter, asking her to collect the new belt and bring it to Champagne Sports. Fortunately the cracked belt lasted until we got there.



This happy crowd was soon joined by other, like-minded enthusiasts and so we felt that the Indaba had got underway even before we had registered. Then onto the tour of the facilities which we found very interesting. Hats off to Eishkom for making this possible.

Registration at the resort was well coordinated and efficient and we soon settled into our Drakensville accommodation which was, as a matter of interest, the housing originally built for the construction workers for the power station and now upgraded and run by the ATKV. When we reached the N3 we swapped over and were on the way home for the final leg of our adventure.

The drive home was uneventful and we arrived safely having driven 675 miles, enjoying it immensely and grateful for a well restored car to do it in. Driving a 1948 car in today's traffic is probably not for everyone and needs a healthy dose of patience and concentration, staying out of the way of those road users less sympathetic to the hobby that we love.



National Indaba History

The Nuffield Challenge Trophy



The Nuffield Challenge Trophy was awarded at the prize giving on Saturday night. The trophy has a rich history and two of our Northern Centre members, Alan Uzzell and Denise Tilburn, shared their story about their involvement with the Cup.

Lord Nuffield, patron of the MG Car Club, donated a gold trophy to the UK Club in 1936 to "enhance the club's prestige, assist with growth, and add to the enthusiasm of its members". The cup at the time cost the equivalent of a new Morris car so the donation was very generous indeed.

As the MG Club expanded internationally with new Centres being formed following the post 1945 boom in MG exports, 4 additional trophies were created. These trophies, of sterling silver, were awarded to Centres in Europe, America, Oceania and Africa. They were originally awarded in 1954, presented by Lord Nuffield with the same purpose of the original Golden Cup. The trophies are all engraved "Nuffield Challenge Trophy" and were intended for the annual competition between all Centres of the MG Car Club for the area.

The cups remain the property of the MG Car Club so can only be presented to an affiliated Club and, in the event of a Club ceasing activity in an area, the Cup is to be returned to Kimber House for safe keeping.

The Nuffield Challenge Trophy Presented to the Kwa-Zulu Natal Centre

It is interesting to note that all the trophies have had some period where they were missing in action and thought lost. The European Cup was missing from 1961-1979, the Oceania Cup went AWOL from 1961- 1987, the American Cup from 1962-1985 and our African trophy was likewise unaccounted for.

The story of locating and collecting the African Nuffield Trophy in 1982 was shared by Alan and Denise:

National Chairman Norman Ewing had been trying without success to locate the trophy and asked ex-Rhodesian Alan if he might be able to help. Alan managed to contact Bill Thomson of the MG Car Club of Zimbabwe in Salisbury who he suspected of having taken the trophy into safekeeping to prevent it being vandalised and misappropriated.

At first, Bill was rather reluctant to acknowledge its whereabouts, knowing its historic importance. Luckily, Alan managed to persuade him that his intentions were honourable and that the cup would be reclaimed on behalf of the MG Club and returned to circulation as originally intended and an agreement was reached.

Denise requested a close friend of hers who was visiting Zimbabwe a short while later, to collect the Cup from Bill. It was told how there was another round of discussions and more convincing before the cup was gingerly handed over to Denise's friend for passage back to South Africa.

The next challenge, now that the cup was in hand, was to ensure a safe crossing over the border. Sheila realised once she had received the cup that it was worth quite a bit and, that without any formal papers, a border crossing could prove to be problematic. With this in mind the best course of action seemed to be hiding the cup in plain view. With daring foresight, the precious cup was wrapped in newspaper, put in two Checkers bags and casually set on the back seat of the car.


The ruse was successful, and the cup was delivered to Alan and Denise, even if it was a little worse for wear.

The Uzzells proceeded to polish the cup to a shine reflective of its former glory and with great pleasure, presented it, in the middle of the night as such important things can't wait, to an astounded and delighted Norman Ewing who knew nothing about what had been going on. The African Nuffield Trophy had been found and was once again part of the MG Club's tradition.

Bill and his wife Jen were brought down by the National body as guests of honour to the 1982 Indaba in Pietermaritzburg.

The trophy, as per Lord Nuffield's original intention, is traditionally presented to the Centre that best represents the growth and enthusiasm for the MG Club and is now given to the Centre that hosts our biennial Indaba in recognition of the huge effort involved. It was accepted this year by organising chairman Chris Brown from Alan and Denise. When not at a formal function, the Trophy resides in the care of Norman Ewing at his home in Johannesburg.

As Alan and Denise continue to be active members of the Northern Centre, our Centre will always be linked to this very important part of MG history.




Alan Uzzell + Denise Tilburn telling the story of the Trophy

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
