Once judging was over the Braai was lit and a relaxed afternoon followed, a very good day.



Complications made recovery slow but, true to his spirit and inner strength, he got through and a full recovery was on the cards. Sadly, the recurrence of the superbug was not foreseen and the Germoline could not help.

We will always remember Jeremy for the stalwart he was and for always being willing to help and partake in the Northern Centre activities. After the rebuild, his "shit hot" blue rubber nose MGB GT, always looked and sounded great. The last road trip he and Denise took in the car was to the KZN Indaba in May last year. That was an epic week we spent in Howick with Claus and Julie followed by the Indaba in the Drakensburg. Memories we will treasure forever.

Jeremy's life was filled with passion, for his family, for motorbikes and MG's.

Always supporting the racing guys on the Saturday at Zwartkops Raceway, Uncle proved to be a true enthusiast as he would return on Sunday for the motorbike racing.

The passion for the family was evident at the memorial held at the Clubhouse. The Salter children and grandchildren are evidence that the apple does not fall from the tree. The love, respect and laughter that flowed late into the night would have made the Uncle smile and pass one of his choice comments.

I got to know the family a little better that night as well as the night after Uncle passed away, when we gathered at the Salter house, together with the Chapman's and Putter's to plan the memorial. Lots and lots of laughter and recounting memories going back to East London days ensured that a fair quantity of wine and beer was re appropriated.

Denise and family will be scattering the ashes at the East London Grand Prix Circuit, my vote would be to spread them across Potters Pass corner, a piece of the circuit Jeremy knew well and loved.

In the interim Jeremy is in his car on the driver's seat and as Denise put it, " he can drive around the garage to his heart's content."

I know "Flat Out" that the sound in the garage will be that of a V8!

As the son of a railwayman I used to travel to primary school in East London every day by train (from Vincent station to Southernwood station to attend my school day at Grens Primary in Oxford Street – yes Jeremy it is the Afrikaans school in East London).

Of course getting concessions to travel at a cheaper rate, due to my fondness for trains, I often travelled to holiday destinations by train. It was something I really enjoyed and when I was a kid the train bug bit me so much so that my ambition was to become a train driver. The steam train era passed and that ambition went with it.

While my career went in a very different direction I always kept my affinity for trains and when I had the chance, especially when travelling in overseas countries, I grabbed at the opportunity to travel to my destinations by train. I have been fortunate enough to have been on, amongst others, the TGF in France twice between Lyon and Paris and also the Eurostar between London and Paris through the Euro Tunnel. Going at over 300mph on a railway line is something very special and something I will cherish forever.

But the wistfulness of travelling by train in my own country never waned and eventually after learning of the Premier Classe train between Johannesburg and Cape Town, Sharleen and I decided that we will take the plunge and travel to my brother's sixtieth birthday celebration in Cape Town by train. Moreover, we also learnt that we could load our car onto the same train and collect it at the station in Cape Town on arrival. Cape Town! It could only have been the TF. What better place in our country to put the top down and let the coastal sights and smells overwhelm your eyes and nostrils. Decision taken!

So, come 2nd May and we were at Johannesburg Station in the TF at 7 am in the morning to have it ready for loading well before the scheduled departure of 10:30. Once we handed the car over to the Railways for loading, we were escorted with our very limited luggage to a lounge on Johannesburg Station where we were served coffee and some snacks. Our luggage was checked in and the next time we saw it was in our very comfortable compartment when we boarded.

The train departed on time and Sharleen and I familiarised ourselves with the train environment and our compartment. Initially we went quite slowly through the urban areas but soon picked up speed and enjoyed the sights of the countryside and an amazing sunset. The "clickety click" of the wheels on the rails was not quite as I remembered it as a kid; it was much quieter and less "clickety click". Improved rail technology has taken that part of the nostalgia away, but it was nevertheless great to hear the occasional "clickety click". Late afternoon we went to the lounge where we sipped some G and Ts and met some of the other passengers, local and foreign, and forged some good friendships.

The evening meal was delightful and was washed down with some red wine after which we retired to the lounge car and had after dinner drinks served. After some lively chatter we eventually got to bed and had a good night's rest with the rhythmic "clickety click" putting us to sleep.

The Fort was built in about 1898 and named after the indigenous trees that grew in the area. Although always lightly manned and armed it did serve as a lookout post during the Boer War. It was declared a military museum and a memorial unveiled in 1979 for those that lost their lives whilst in military service.

On Show Day, the gates will open at **08h00** and an entry fee of **R50** per car will be levied to subsidize dash plaques and programs

The concours events are the main themes for the day, but the Fort is a great venue to take in some of the history of the area and a scenic spot for relaxing with some MG friends and enthusiasts. Food and drink carts are planned for early morning and braai fires will be lit closer to lunch time.


Club members are encouraged to participate in the concours events.

Concours d'etat cars are scored on originality, condition and cleanliness. The tops only entrants are marked on condition and cleanliness only. While the judging and scoring introduces a competitive element to the day, the real spirit of show-day is that of fun and encouragement to MG enthusiast to "maintain the breed".

The concours de' elegance requires that entrants parade their cars whilst in elegant period dress or in the concours de' comique event in amusing attire reflecting the fun element of MG motoring.

Relaxed in beautiful surroundings, living in what is effectively the Oviston Nature reserve on the South side of the Gariep Dam, I could easily get used to that. Always the most generous and gracious hosts, I felt completely at home. On route to Oviston, from Bethulie, some 40km away, we crossed the longest bridge in the country spanning the Orange River. We stopped for a photo shoot in stunning countryside and popped open a couple of Hansas. I was brought down to earth by a snapping sound and blue smoking coming from the right rear tyre. I pulled over to check and realized the right rear suspension bolt had broken (first time it happened to EMGEEGP and that is 223 000km odd since I have owned her from new). Panic set in when I realized the blue smoke was coming from flames just behind the brake disc and realizing that the fire extinguisher I usually carry was used on a house fire in August last year and never replaced. After a few deep breaths I remembered the water I always carry (thanks to mama Mighty Mouse for drumming this into me) and the fire was put out. The grease from the broken CV boot had caught fire. If you breakdown in the Karoo the best place to do it is close to Dave Wheeler the MG Craftsman. I was 63km from Oviston and a phone call away. Dave said he would be there in an hour. What

Here was the opportunity to enjoy the view. I locked the car and took off into the wide open space, an hour I enjoyed more than I expected.



Although not a busy road, the first car to stop while I was still at the MG, was a policewoman offering help and a lift to Ventersstad. The second were two delivery guys who turned around on a narrow road with trailer to see if they could help. While I was walking in the Karoo three different farmers stopped and asked "Boetie, kan ek hulp?" All three had seen the stranded car, driven past and then saw me in the open and came back to offer help. My faith in humanity and the universe restored. What followed was even more humbling, after an hour I was back at the car and along came the now familiar Craftsman Auto Bakkie with Dave at the wheel followed by Maureen driving the MGF. No sooner had we driven my car onto the trailer and tied it down, that the contents of my boot were transferred to the MGF and in not so many words Dave told be to "go and enjoy myself". He and Maureen headed back home with the injured MGTF on the trailer (128km round trip) while I started off to Cradock at a gingerly pace in their MGF. Remarkable gesture, not only generous but absolute show of trust with their pride possession.



It is truly a privilege to belong to this MG family and have so many friends that have been ready to assist me in many ways, all at a drop of a hat, a truly humbling experience, this the most recent of many occasions.



On arrival in Cradock we were greeted by a local group of musicians on the verandah, with their special brand of Karoo music. 




