
The next event is the August Club Night on the 16th where the catering will be a surprise, an evening not to be missed however rsvp is essential. This month's Club run will count for Clubman and Victor/trix points. The driving tests will be held at our trusted Silver Oaks Crossing Shopping Centre on the 25th August followed by lunch and prize giving at one of the restaurants as we have done before. I will get prices and see what we can do to get specials for participants from the restaurants. Details will be published closer to the event.

In September, our Noggin will be a presentation on the Galp Rally that happened on the 16th June this year. Our member Ian Greyling a participant and Tony Barbosa the organizer will talk to us about the event with a view to boosting participation from our club in the third running of the rally in 2020.

There are 64 residents and 14 staff, a total of 78 people that we will be taking for drives on a 500m route near the home. Followed by a boerewors Braai and a social to chat with residents, the event well worth attending.

Ideally we would like to get 35 cars to spread the load and keep the rides to two circuits per car, when we did it in 2015 we managed with 15 cars, the more cars the more people the more the MG fun. The residents love a good party so there will be music on a boom box a day not to be missed.

The meeting point at Petropoort Heidelberg was a reminder of the madness of the city as we joined the rich and famous on their way to the Durban July. We found a space behind the complex to gather our relatively calm forces. After a hot chocolate and first breakfast, we joined the throng of travellers in the expensive cars heading for the coast.

We were pleased to leave the motorway a few kilometres later and follow the classic DJ motorcycle route. A road less travelled by the masses though farming country, with wonderful scenery and spectacular aloes.

Vrede, a town in the Free State that is an agricultural hub, is where we had lunch, gate crashing the local pub. I can imagine it being quite rowdy on a weekend night as the local farmers descend on it.

A few of us headed to Memel (Memel-Zamani as it is now called) a small Free State town located close to kwaZulu-Natal and Mpumalanga borders, for a quiet one at the local hotel before heading on to join the main group at Newcastle where Majuba Lodge was our home for the night. There we gathered in the pub for pre-dinner drinks before enjoying a generous buffet.

The roads were in a fair condition with stretches of brilliant driving sections interrupted by others that had severe pot holes and dreaded speed bumps.

The local car club had invited the Durban Dash Tour to display our cars at the next door shopping centre on Saturday morning. A quick morning car cleaning got everyone out for bed bright and early. The cars received a lot of attention in the parkade but whether the admirers where there for the cars or the Casio keyboard player we will never know.

It was interesting to see a fairly rare Nissan Figaro on display. Made on the base of the Micra it reflects the retro styling popularised in the New Beetle and the Mini Cooper. The cars were manufactured in 1991 with about 20 000 units made. Avril has her name down in case the owner decides to sell.

After the show, some guys in the fellowship decided to take the motorway to Scottburgh and some continued along the road less travelled. We were introduced to town names, some familiar, some not. The route eventually took us through Hilton, on and off the freeway and through Pietermaritzburg. We then ventured towards Umbumbulu winding through the sugar cane fields to finally join the motorway and arrive at our destination, Scottburgh.


