Notice from the Treasurer

Projections on the future financial well being of your Club indicate that ongoing increases in rent, electricity, Clubhouse maintenance costs, affiliation fees and insurance etc, combined with a reduction in membership, mean that an increase in annual subscriptions is required. This is not an issue to be taken lightly as we know some of our members may find this a challenge. An increase of R50 to R250 per annum from January 2015 has been approved by the Exco. Hopefully, this will stem the tide for a few years.

Taken logically, the increase is around the cost of 3I of petrol, bringing the subs to an equivalent of 16I of petrol per year, or 2 cases of beer. A bargain surely.



Fork The Clutch-Plate

having my "Daily Driver" back on the road. Hopefully in amongst the wedding planning and the ongoing threat of having to return to the DRC I will be able to get her back on the road and enjoy some of the great spring weather we are experiencing at the moment.

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
